WHAT CAN THE TOWN DO ABOUT ICE THAT HAS BUILT UP ON THE SIDEWALK OR AROUND OUR MAILBOX?

We've heard from people in several areas of Town where ice has developed on sidewalks around community mailboxes. This is generally a problem when the mailbox is on the south side of the street or where solid board privacy fences and multi-story homes block the sunlight. We recommend that residents use de-icing products or sand to make the areas more passable.

WHAT IF I HAVE AN EMERGENCY AND MY STREET ISN'T PLOWED?

As in any emergency, call 911. Emergency agencies are in contact with our Public Works staff during storm conditions and can ask to divert snow plowing equipment if necessary.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP?

There are several steps community members can take to help ensure their safety during winter storm conditions, including the following:

- Do not drive unless necessary.
- Have your car adequately prepared with snow tires or chains.
- Drive at reduced speeds, brake slowly and leave extra space between vehicles.
- Maintain a safe distance from snow plowing equipment, pass plows with extreme caution and watch for abrupt snow plow movements.
- Do not park along snow routes, and in residential areas, move vehicles off the street, if possible.
- Help your neighbors to clear the snow in your area, and consider volunteering to help community members who are elderly or physically unable to clear their sidewalks.

The Town fields many questions and complaints about snow and ice in Parker. We want to share the following information with the community as a whole.

WHEN WILL MY STREET GET PLOWED?

The Engineering and Public Works Department, which is responsible for snow plowing, has set up a priority system. However, the time required to clear the roads also depends on conditions such as the snowstorm intensity and duration, as well as the temperature.

Arterial roadways are our top priority and will be cleared first; these are the major roadways that carry the most volume, such as Lincoln Avenue and Jordan Road. (As a State Highway, Parker Road is maintained by the Colorado Department of Transportation.)

Our second priority is collector streets. These are streets that provide access to the major arterials, such as Dransfeldt, Motsenbocker and Pine Lane. They will be cleared once the major roadways have been plowed.

Local residential roads and cul-desacs that provide traffic flow within subdivisions and access to homes are not plowed unless 6 or more inches of snow has accumulated and continues to fall, or if major drifting has occurred.

Residents need to take precautions to ensure that their vehicles can travel in residential streets with up to 6 inches of snow. We recommend equipping your vehicle with snow tires or chains.

WHY DOESN'T THE TOWN PLOW RESIDENTIAL STREETS UNLESS THE SNOW IS 6 INCHES OR HIGHER?

This decision is based primarily on budgetary limitations. The Town simply doesn't have the resources to clear all streets during regular snowfalls. To do more plowing, the Town would have to take resources from other services. Plowing the priority streets opens routes into all residential areas and provides access to cleared roads within a few blocks of most homes.

We understand that many of our residents have moved from warmer places and may not be familiar with driving in snowy conditions. Snow is a fact of life in Colorado, and residents should make sure their vehicles are prepared for winter driving by having adequate snow tires or chains. Residents may also need to clear snow from their driveways and curbs to make them passable.

WHY DOES THE TOWN PLOW SNOW ONTO MY SIDEWALK WHEN I'VE ALREADY CLEARED IT?

We understand that this situation frustrates many residents when it occurs. Rest assured, we do not do this intentionally. To remove snow from the streets, the snow must be moved to the side. Changing the angle of the blade would leave snow in the street. Although many residents shovel their sidewalks early, our plows often come through after that time, especially in residential areas, based on our

priority system. Cleanup and widening operations may take place one to four days after a storm depending on the severity of the weather. We're sorry for the inconvenience, but hope you appreciate our efforts to keep the roads passable.

WHAT ARE MY RESPONSIBILITIES REGARDING SNOW REMOVAL?

Property owners, including residents and businesses, are responsible for clearing their sidewalks of ice and snow within 48 hours after the snow has stopped falling. If the snow or ice is so hard it is difficult to remove, property owners may use sand or another abrasive material on the sidewalk to make it reasonably safe until the weather permits clearing the walkway.

WHEN WILL TOWN TRAILS BE CLEARED?

During larger snow storms that require residential street plowing (six inches or more), Town trails will be plowed after residential roads have been plowed.
